EDITOR'S NOTE FROM THE DESK OF MOLLIE MALONE, 1825

It's April 1825 and Peter Robinson is forced to reduce his list from 50,000 applicants to a mere 2,000 candidates who will travel on nine ships to Upper Canada.

From April 12th to April 26th Mr Robinson is circling the Blackwater Valley area to issue embarkation certificates.

It is a difficult task for Peter Robinson who finds it "painful to decide" among so many worthy candidates, who should stay and who should go.

He says, "I never had a more unpleasant duty to perform than that of making the selection."

Some of the people who have been lucky enough to be chosen are having second thoughts about what lies ahead and what's left behind.






"INTO THE WEST" **Family Movie Night**



#### **"LETTER OF 1827"**

With regard to the letter from 1827, which was published in last month's newsletter, we have had several inquiries as to whether John Callahan's son Cornelius, who stayed behind in Ireland on bad advice, ever made it to Canada.

Mary Callaghan has replied as follows:

"Cornelius eventually came to Canada in the mid 1830's. He married Mary Twohey, daughter of Dennis Twohey and Catherine Mahoney. Cornelius died in 1847 leaving Mary with six children, the youngest also died in 1847. Cornelius, Mary and baby Cornelius are buried in St. Mary's Cemetery, Lindsay.

A few years ago we discovered Mary Twohey Callaghan's 1884 funeral card in the family bible at the Callaghan farm in Reaboro. It had been there 138 years and no one knew who she was. The discovery of the card and finding DNA cousins on Ancestry who descend from Cornelius proved our connection and rewrote our family history. My great great grandfather Dennis was a younger brother of Cornelius. These discoveries proved we descend from Peter Robinson settlers, John and Norah Callaghan."

It is amazing how a letter found in a digitized copy of an old Irish newspaper, and a card found in a family bible, can open a small window into the lives of people who would otherwise simply remain names and dates on a family tree or on some moss covered headstone.

#### IRELAND. A TERRIBLE BEAUTY IS BORN.

Irish poet William Butler Yates spent a large part of his lifetime trying to revive the Celtic spirit in the Irish people who, after 700 years of colonization by the English, had all but lost their language, their culture and their identity. In his final poem, "Under Ben Bulben". Yates called on vounger poets to take up his cause, to remind the Irish people of their heroic past and to give Ireland back her pride and her dignity.

- 1: In what year did the first Downeyville Irish Concert take place? We have no idea !!! Do you? Our best guess... the 1920's
- 2: When was the first Parish rectory built? Only 1 rectory built in 1880.

- 4: Who was the first parish priest in Downeyville? Father John Burke was 1st resident priest in 1852 & lived in a local hotel.

- 8: In what year was the new St. Luke's Catholic Church built? 1858 - The original log Church was built in 1833.
- 9: From whom did the diocese purchase the Church property and in what year? Bartholomew Downey in 1857/1858.

















A diet consisting primarily of potatoes and buttermilk might sound like a 'dismal repast' but, it seems this humble combination provides almost all the nutrition required for sustaining a healthy body. As an indirect result of this and the fact that the Irish poor came to depend on potatoes and buttermilk for sustenance out of necessity, birth rates increased, mortality rates decreased and Ireland's population nearly doubled from 1790 to 1840. As the population grew larger, the farm plots grew smaller and the dependency on potatoes was almost total. That left Ireland very vulnerable when the potato blight hit in 1845.



The Claddagh is one of Ireland's most recognized and precious images. Two hands embracing a heart adorned with a crown symbolize the purity of a cherished relationship - friendship (cairdeas), love (grá) and loyalty (dílseacht).
